Meet the **Receptionists**



Sue Watson and volunteer Barbara McGoldrick are part of a friendly reception team made up of staff and volunteers that work during the day, evenings (until 7pm), weekends and Bank Holidays.

Tell me something about vourself.

Sue: I have worked for the Hospice for 24 years and remember when the Ward was carpetted. We had two cats named after painkillers, Morph and Dex.

I absolutely adore cooking and learning French.

What does a typical day or evening look like?

Sue: We deal with most of the phone calls for the whole building and some days we answer up to 100 calls. The calls range from

stressed families needing help to a caller asking whether we have any Kilts for sale in our shops.

Barbara: I spend the day and early evening answering calls, welcoming visitors, sorting the post and deliveries and noting car registrations for car parking.

What do you enjoy most about your role?

Sue: Meeting people and working with great colleagues plus every day is different.

Barbara: The staff here, from the ward, admin, through to Barbara Gale, are wonderful in thanking volunteers such as myself for any time we give. It's absolutely wonderful!

What do you find challenging about the

role?

Sue: It can get a little stressful when you are on your own on reception, with phone calls, people buying items and visitors asking you to register their car details.

Barbara: The only challenge I find is not being aware of staff changes or new names. Sometimes it can take me a few minutes to track down the staff I need to pass the query on to.

We can all help the reception team with their role by saying hello and letting them know who we are and what we do, especailly if we are new. You can also let them know when you are out of the office.

Beavers, bakers and chefs

Beavers, bakers, chefs and pumpkin paraders all raised money for the Hospice this month.

November has been a busy month for fundraisers, as the young and old get involved in raising money in a variety of ways.

Below is a selection of events that have taken place since the last Network news.

Bury Beavers raised £1,541 by slipping on their fluffy bunny ears and pyjamas for a sponsored walk around Nowton Park.

Good Sense Research, a food and drink market research company, hosted the Great Bury Bake Off. Hospice staff, Rachel Card, Corporate Fundraiser and Annie Spillane, Communications Assistant, were lucky enough to judge the nine tasty entries at the event which raised £124.75.

The Crown in Bildeston raised £10,000 by inviting six chefs to cook up a five course dinner for guests. Over 50 diners paid £90 a head for the dinner which included canapes, quails eggs, lamb, patridge and petits fours.

The Hospice's first Pumpkin Parade was smashing fun for the whole family.

Cambridge Care Company sponsored the fun filled event which raised £2,000, 84 children completed the 1km pumpkin themed walk around the Hospice

grounds.

Volunteers from the Hospice's Brandon shop got into the swing of it and raised £205 from their 1940's dance event.

Whilst die-hard Dr Who fans dressed up as their favourite Time Lord characters at the Bury St Edmunds Christmas Fayre. They raised £2,464.28 by inviting members of the public to have their photo taken with the Doctors in return for a donation to the Hospice.

Cricketers from four West Suffolk teams pulled on their pads, took up their bats and battled it out in a friendly cricket league at Nowton Cricket Club, to raise £1,500.
